The **Sanctuary Lamp**, also known as the **Chancel Lamp**, hangs from the ceiling over the Chancel steps. It contains a wax candle placed in a red glass container suspended within the brass lamp. The 7-day candle burns day and night, signifying the eternal presence of God through Christ as the Light of the World. The colour red represents the Blood of Christ and the Flame of the Holy Spirit.

Charles Edward Reid, warden from 1934-35,
and of his wife, Susannah Sandford, by their family.

The Calendar Lent and the Imagination (2)

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In the beginning was the Word, wrote St John. At the beginning of The Beginning, or Genesis, we know that God said *Let there be light*; and there was light. God spoke the world into being. No matter that the light came (v. 3) before the Sun (v. 16), because Genesis chapter 1 is poetry. It is an account for our imagination. It is the organization of the Earth and the Cosmos - a word we use for space and beyond, but which also means, in Greek, *order and decency*, or *decorative beauty* (hence cosmetics). A fusion of rational order and aesthetic value. Genesis describes the Creation as God's language, and St John echoes its analogy and allusion. Language is the symbols we use to communicate. Some words are relatively unambiguous, for instance *Stop*, but other sounds convey multiplicities of meanings, as in *set*. We use ambiguity not to confuse or to celebrate imprecision, but to enrich. It is a gift. The brass cross on our altar is a symbol of liberation, but in a few weeks it will remind us particularly of great suffering. It stands for everything, yet on it all was taken away. It conveys honour and shame. Ambiguity and paradox are characteristics of the poetic imagination. When Gerard Manley Hopkins became a Jesuit just over a hundred years ago, they tried to stifle his poetic genius. Fortunately for us his language got out. He celebrated God's sponsorship of unconformity:

Glory be to God for dappled things –

For skies of couple-colour as a brinded cow;

For rose-moles all in stipple upon trout that swim;

Fresh firecoal chestnut-falls; finches' wings;

Landscape plotted and pieced – fold, fallow, and plough;

And all trades, their gear and tackle and trim.

All things counter, original, spare, strange;

Whatever is fickle, freckled (who knows how?)

With swift, slow; sweet, sour; adazzle, dim;

He fathers-forth whose beauty is past change:

Praise him.

Samaritan woman "Sir, I see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshipped on this mountain, but you say that the place where people must worship is in Jerusalem."

Jesus "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. Narrator Jesus came to a Samaritan city called Sychar, near the plot of ground that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by his journey, was sitting by the well. It was about noon. His disciples had gone to the city to buy food. A Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her,

Jesus "Give me a drink."

Samaritan woman "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?"

Narrator Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans.

Jesus "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water."

Samaritan woman "Sir, you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob, who gave us the well, and with his sons and his flocks drank from it?"

Jesus "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life."

Samaritan woman "Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

Jesus "Go, call your husband, and come back."

Samaritan woman "I have no husband."

Jesus "You are right in saying, 'I have no husband'; for you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true!"

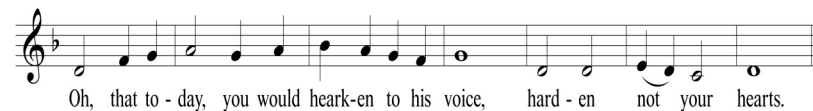
A Reading from the Book of Exodus

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarrelled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The Lord said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarrelled and tested the Lord, saying, "Is the Lord among us or not?" (*Exodus 17:1-7*)

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person - though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us. Much more surely then, now that we have been justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. But more than that, we even boast in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation. (*Romans 5:1-11*)
